Neutral colors - Black, Navy, Brown, White, Tan, Gray Suit or sports jacket, or business dress Suit pants or slacks

Dress shoes, low heel

Tips for Both Occasions

Wear what makes you feel confident and stay true to who you are

Consider a uniform to avoid decision fatigue, for example, have a few neutral colored shirts and slacks to rotate through

When in doubt, dress professionally

Make sure your outfit is wrinkle free and check for missing buttons, lint, or a crooked tie

Stick with solid colors or simple patterns: Shirts with lettering or graphics should not be worn

Accessories should be kept simple and hair should be groomed

A skirt or dress should be no shorter than the tips of your middle fingers
